ANNUAL REVIEW AND SUMMARY FINANCIAL STATEMENTS For the year ended 31 December 2020

The past year has represented a time of extraordinary challenge that has affected the lives of everyone living in the diocese and all those who share in the mission of the Church across our parishes, schools and diverse communities. 2020 started well with some clear progress in areas of our diocesan mission as we continued to fulfil the aspirations set out within our Growing Disciples strategy. At the centre of all our planning and praying is a commitment to announce the Good News of God's love in Jesus Christ and to invite all people to respond to his saving grace. At the beginning of the second decade of the $21^{\rm st}$ century we are convinced that there is nothing better anyone can do with their life than become a follower of Jesus Christ. This reality is seen in the stories of people of all backgrounds and ages coming to new faith in God. It also lies at the heart of decision making, management of resources, creative developments, as well as the steady and faithful ongoing ministry of every parish.

As a diocese we are a mission enterprise whose roots are woven in the fabric of what has made and shaped communities across the region over many centuries. We are also a dynamic network of local churches whose common purpose is to live for Christ in our present age, mutually supportive of one another above all in seeking fresh ways to make Christ known, as well as demonstrating his transforming love in ways that can bring hope and healing to all. A significant expression of our God-given ministry is through our Church schools who have excelled in their mission through the past year, serving with immense courage and creativity through every twist and turn created by the coronavirus pandemic.



March 2020 brought about a dramatic change to every one living in our nation, as the first restrictions were put in place to suppress the rising rates of coronavirus infections. Within a few weeks the government announcement a national 'lockdown' which meant that all in-person services were suspended. Within a short time clergy, lay ministers and congregations across the diocese found new

ways to sustain the life of the church and serve the most vulnerable in our communities. This included new on-line services and small groups to nurture faith in such difficult times, as well as practical care with churches supplying foodbanks, offering care packages and joining with other key stake holders to provide support to those who were self-isolating or living alone. Our church buildings may have been closed for a time but the church was very much alive.

Coming out of the first 'lockdown', while recognising the challenges that were still ahead until vaccinations could be found, many churches established patterns of ministry that included both on-line and in-person services and groups. In the meantime, the Bishop's Core Team began to develop a series of work streams that would support the accelerated change created by the circumstances of the coronavirus. The Bishop's Council, with significant engagement from Area Deans, Jubilee House staff and other clergy and lay leaders, was able to help shape



this work so that it can be most effective while we discern how God is equipping his Church for a new season of fruitful ministry. The key streams of work do not create a new operational strategy but are intended to facilitate the accelerated change that is already happening within our commitment to Growing Disciples.

Seven streams of work

1. Transformation Change
Appointments – Increasing the number
of clergy appointments that enable
significant change that can facilitate
growth; many of these will be time-


specific appointments that ensure we do not reduce the level of stipendiary ministry while maintaining flexibility in future deployment planning in the medium term.

- 2. New models of Local Missional Leadership Developing more quickly our planning in training and commissioning people who are equipped and called to lead local mission, within new initiatives and existing parishes.
- 3. Youth and Children Growing Disciples Task Group To build on the good heritage of children and youth ministry in the diocese, as well as the recent experience with the YoungLife learning communities, to address the significant need to revitalise our mission among and with children and youth; including the new possibilities working in partnership with our Church schools. A task group was established under the leadership of the Bishop of Sherwood, resulting in an application for Strategic Development Funding to help facilitate a new and ambitions programme of mission.
- 4. Communications Review To review all aspects of our present communication strategy in light of the new opportunities the past 12months has generated with social media platforms, especially as we engage our 'core constituency' as well as those presently beyond the life of the church
- 5. Increasing Diversity With renewed vision for a more diverse church, which includes addressing systemic issues that unintentionally limits our mission and undermines the gospel. This is particularly in response to the issues raised by the death of George Floyd and the challenge it created for the Church.
- 6. Well-being and Resilience Under the direction of the Principal for Well-being and Ministry Development the diocese is developing new resources and increasing awareness in addressing Relational, Physical, Mental and Spiritual Health.
- 7. Prayer Stream Prayer is the engine of the Church in mission and in the context of increased challenge and change in society, we are seeking to foster an increasing engagement with patterns of prayer that can sustain and inspire radical discipleship.

Supporting the present and future shape of ministry in the diocese, we are grateful that God has continued to call people into new spheres of service, as incumbents, curates, head teachers, into other forms of leadership in local churches and across chaplaincies. We have also been pleased to welcome a new Diocesan Chief Executive, Director of Education, Senior Safeguarding Lead, as well as celebrating the consecration of a new Bishop of Sherwood. All of these people bring new insights and gifts to the life of the diocese at this time and we are deeply thankful for the contribution they have made even with the

person with congregations and colleagues. Ensuring that we embed good Safeguarding practices into every part of the life of the diocese is essential to our mission. Our new Senior and Assistant Diocesan Safeguarding Advisors have brought new skills and experience to this work in 2020, while we have also undertaken the first phase of the important Past Cases Review 2.

PLANS AND ACHIEVEMENTS

Financial plans in the 2020 budget set out to:

- Realise a small surplus budget based on 100% of deanery share being allocated and paid
- to target an 2% overall Parish share, increase but depending on attendance & ministry numbers individual deaneries will vary
- provide for the number of people based on strength rather than establishment in moving towards 2020 deployment plans
- provide for an increase in clergy stipends and staff salaries of 2%
- continue to use Strategic Development Funding to support new major projects in the Diocese
- provide a Growing Disciples fund to assist all parishes in their growing disciples plans and initiatives

ACTIVITIES AND ACHIEVEMENTS IN THE YEAR

The activities below, which are some rather than all, only relate to those undertaken directly by employees of the Board. Activities within parishes are reported in each of their separate annual report and accounts.

The year started well, and then in March 2020, the country went into Lockdown due to Covid 19. Many of our churches rose to the challenge of on line worship and live streaming services, and the bedrock of planned giving allowed our ministry to continue, despite the challenges we were all facing. After a few weeks, as we adjusted to the new world of lockdown, we quickly endorsed and publicised the C of E's online giving offering through SumUp and Give a Little, with an encouraging take up by parishes. This has continued to grow throughout the year, and enabled churches to bring in donations from a new sources as they lost income from envelope giving, hall rental and fundraising events. This has also allowed churches to place "donate now" buttons on their websites and ACNY entries, place QR codes across social media and printed materials and grow in their learning of digital platforms for giving in a way that would never have been envisaged under normal times.

Despite the effect of the Covid 19 pandemic, further progress has been made in our projects to continue to grow disciples. Funding has been made available from the Growing Disciples Fund, and the New Worshipping Communities Fund to assist with costs of live streaming worship and other new worshipping communities. It should be remembered that all these projects are match funded from Diocesan Resources. Our teaching and learning resources all went on line and we delivered courses via various online mediums. We developed the workplace chaplaincy further by supporting a new team in Sherwood and in partnership with Nottinghamshire Police have relaunched chaplaincy support to the force.

The Diocesan team provided support to all our church school leaders, incumbents, curates, churchwardens and PCC members over the course of the Covid 19 pandemic with weekly updates and resources.

After quiet summer months, September brought a flurry of updates and inspiring news stories, beginning with St. Wilfred's Church, Scooby and All Saint's Church, Babworth, who were both featured on BBC's Songs of Praise on Sunday 13th September as part of their 400 years Pilgrim Centenary Celebrations.

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In the same month, we celebrated the ordination of the new Bishop of Sherwood, the Rev'd Andrew Emerton. Andy began his journey to ordination from Southwell Minster and travelled north to a service at York Minster, which was lived streamed to thousands of viewers from across the globe, overcoming some of the social distancing restrictions that were in place at that time.

This year ordinations, which usually take place in July, were delayed until September, and by necessity, took on a very different feel. With attendance inside the minster still largely prohibited, our celebrations had a more reflective tone and we witnessed a most challenging return to school for our staff and pupils, which was reported by ITV Central News who visited Hucknall National Coff Primary school to see the wellbeing and safety measures put swiftly into place for pupils attending classes after many months of home schooling.

Both Bishops have been interviewed by BBC Radio Nottingham throughout the year, offering messages of hope and support in these difficult times.

Our Christmas campaign, Light in the Darkness, saw Bishop Paul in more reflective mood as he brought this most challenging year to its close. Many thousands of people watched this year's video and enjoyed a series of prayers and reflections we shared throughout the Advent period. The Discipleship and Ministry team has continued to be active in training and developing both lay and ordained ministers moving its provision promptly to online teaching to meet the challenges of the COVID-19 restrictions. They ran a successful diocesan conference online with over 200 people in attendance and Bishop Emma Ineson speak on Godly Ambition, and the Church Schools Leaders Conference was also held on Zoom. They continue to develop vocations to lay and ordained ministries welcoming 14 new trainee for Licensed Lay Ministry and 11 new ordinands. Despite the pandemic, 4 New Worshipping Communities were started in 2020 bringing the total launched to 21.

We supported 5 members of the clergy with their retirement plans and assisted with moving 18 clergy families in housing in the Diocese.

FUTURE PLANS

In 2021, the focus on our response to climate change will continue, aiming to cut our carbon footprint and promote eco church and to encourage further our understanding of caring for creation as central to whole life discipleship. The Diocesan Advisory Group will also instigate a strategy for our church buildings across the Diocese and aim to improve our church building carbon footprint and increase awareness and use of environmental products and services.

There will be continued need to work with cross agency partners to tackle homelessness and modern slavery, and to support local church responses to the needs of rough sleepers refugees and asylum seekers, in the city and county.

We will also support the ministry of chaplains and sector ministries by holding a chaplaincy gathering with the Bishop of Sherwood in the summer and aim to appoint a chaplain in Hucknall to complete our network of chaplains, and we are exploring ways of supporting the partnership between churches and schools. We will also encourage parishes to consider local models of town centre or high street chaplaincy such as those in Beeston and Sherwood.

The 2020 budget plan for deanery share was for 100% to be allocated and paid. The Board of Finance received 87.3% of deanery share due for the year a decrease, in cash terms, on the previous year of £226,000 (2019 – 94.5%, a increase of £38,000). The Board is immensely grateful for the continued support from parishes who have faithfully paid their share in full to support ministry in the Diocese. The revised Parish share calculation was approved at Synod in 2018 and forms the basis of parish share calculations. As the new calculation shows some significant variations between deaneries, there is currently a transitional route to move Deaneries onto the new calculation.

The variance in the Church Commissioners receipts is due to the timing of the Strategic Development Fund claims against the budget, with a corresponding decrease in the costs of the SDF projects. The Board also received £250,000 in respect of a Covid 19 support grant from Church Commissioners. The variance on Direct Ministry costs is a higher than expected clergy vacancy level, and the underspend on Future ministry costs is due to cancelled residentials and training due to the pandemic. The Support costs underspend relates mainly to delayed timing on SDF projects, together with underspending on all Jubilee House departments, and furlough income to off-set staffing costs.

Net income returns on investments were slightly down against budget, as financial returns were hit by the pandemic. We are currently receiving additional Mineral Extraction royalties in

respect of Cromwell Quarry which will last until 2021. The overall return has decreased to 2.75% from 3.3%. Statutory fees receipts have decreased again year on year mainly due to the closure of churches due to Covid 19, and a significant reduction in the number of weddings taking place during 2020.

The grant from the Allchurches Trust Ltd annual distribution amounted to £139,500 and the Board of Finance acknowledges with thanks the receipt of this grant.

PERSONNEL

It must be remembered that this report only deals with those who are employees of the Board of Finance and therefore although there have been a number of changes within parochial clergy and licensed lay workers these are not detailed here.

During the year new additions to the Diocesan team include Paula Carlin (Deanery Administrator), Jo Kaiser (Reception), Nigel Frith (Director of Education), Becky Sharp (Finance), Lucy Grimsey, Julian Hodgson and Maria Voce (all Safeguarding), Laura Jowett & Sarah Patten (Discipleship & Ministry),

Leavers in the year include Richard Ellis, Karen Gillespie, Caroline Thornton, Andrew McKibbin, Louise Riley, Jo Tilley and Tracey West.

The Board of Finance places on record its appreciation to these and all staff for their dedicated service over the past year.


